- set the scene

- When telling a story in the past, use both the preterite and the imperfect. Use the imperfect to tell what people and things were like, to give background information, and to set the scene. Use the preterite to tell what happens. To begin a story use these words.

Once upon a time

Había una vez

There once was

Hace unos (muchos, cinco...) años A few (many, five . . .) years ago

Preterite and imperfect to continue and end a story

- 1 Remember that the **imperfect** tells what people used to do, what people, things or situations were like, how things used to be, and what was going on when something else happened. The **preterite** tells what happened or what changed.
- 2 Use these phrases to continue your story:

fue cuando	that was when
entonces	so, then
luego	then, later
después	after, afterward

3 Use these phrases to end your story:

por fin	finally
al final	in the end
vivieron felices	they lived happily ever after
así fue que	so that's how
